## CTA Trustee Elections

The election of new board members is held in March at the annual meeting. This year the annual meeting will be held on Saturday, March 11, from 9 a.m. until noon, at the Baxter Theatres.

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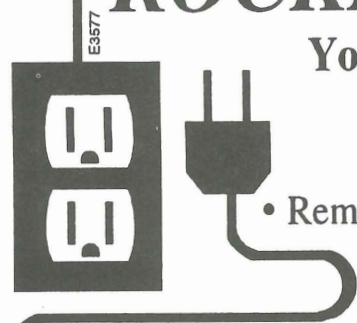

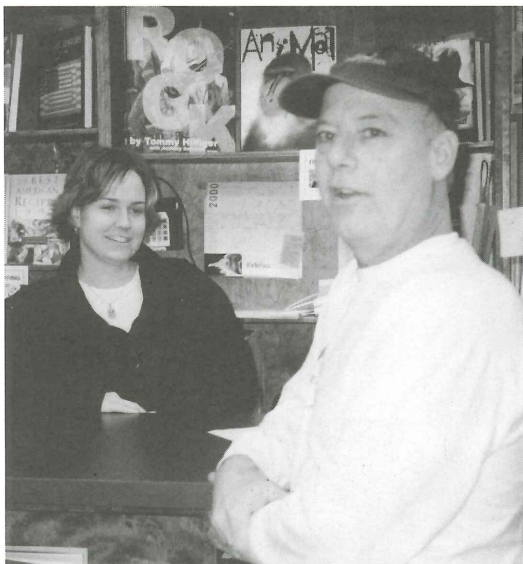
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Michael Boggs at Carmichael's Bookstore

## Louisville's Oldest Independent Bookstore ... a Triangle Treasure

Casually dressed in baseball cap and sweatshirt, Michael Boggs, owner of Carmichael's Bookstore exemplifies the "old shoe" comfort of the store. He doesn't begin to resemble most people's ideas of a pioneer, but he and his wife Carol were exactly that — pioneers — when they opened their first store at Bardstown Rd. and Bonnycastle on April 15, 1978.

Boggs is quick to say, "We opened just a short time after the Bristol opened. It was the Bristol that really brought a different feel to the Bardstown Rd. stretch from Highland Ave. to Bonnycastle. It's hard now to remember how

spotty Bardstown Rd. was in those days. There were closed storefronts. Some empty stores had been vandalized and many had garbage scattered at the front doors.

"It was just four years after the tornado and probably the nadir of retail business on Bardstown Rd."

What brought Carol and Michael Boggs to a then-struggling retail area to open a small bookstore? Actually, their odyssey to Bardstown Rd. began in Chicago where they had worked and lived in a "residential but diverse area with a well-defined retail sector." In Chicago, too, their work had been the bookstore business. However, Boggs says, "We began to feel that Chicago had too many people chasing too few services."

Although Carol and Michael Boggs met in college in Florida, each has Kentucky ties. He grew up in Bowling Green and she lived in Louisville where her father was an executive with GE.

As they considered a move, Louisville seemed to have many of the advantages of Chicago — and fewer of the problems. Because of its similarity to Chicago's Near North Side, where they had been living and working, Carol and Michael felt that the Bardstown Road area would support a bookstore.

So, they moved to Louisville, obtained a small business loan, and have been Cherokee Triangle fixtures, working and living in or near the Triangle ever since.

In 1983, they bought their home on Willow Avenue, and, at about the same time, moved their bookstore to the corner of Bardstown Road and Longest.

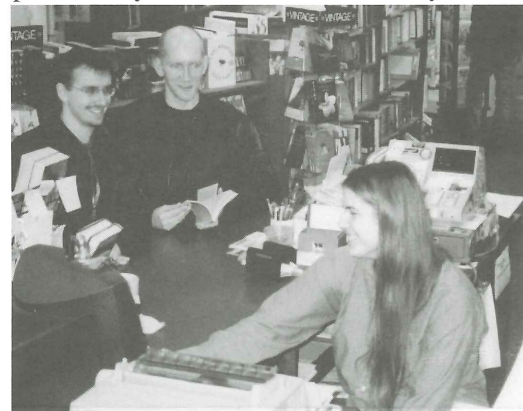
"In the beginning, we worked all of the time — 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Through the years,

though, we've each taken time away," reflects Michael. "Carol has been with Brown-Foreman for five years, and, in 1992, I became full-time again."

Perhaps because Michael Boggs has spent so much time at his store, it has a comfortable, "user-friendly" atmosphere. Boggs maintains, "It's like having people in your home. Someone may spill coffee, but that's not a reason to get upset. Like home, though, if people are unpleasant, we send them out."

"You have to put yourself on the other side of the counter," continues Boggs. "I don't want anyone to be uncomfortable in my store. I want to make people feel welcome and help customers have a good experience at Carmichael's. If someone wants a book we don't have, I'll order it or call another bookseller for them."

As user-friendly as their boss, the staff seems to enjoy working at Carmichael's. Boggs reports that he doesn't have much turnover, noting, "I like to be on the sales floor as much as possible. My staffers observe me and my attitude

toward customers, and they learn what I think is important, but I also want my employees to have some autonomy and be able to make decisions. I tell them they'll manage a situation properly, even if they don't handle it exactly the way I would. It's important for them to feel they can resolve problems and help customers without having to check with me. That's part of giving good service — solving problems for customers quickly."

Boggs believes that independent retailers must be quickly responsive and service oriented to retain their niche in the market.

His emphasis on service and responsiveness shows in his collaboration with other business owners at the busy corner of Longest Avenue and Bardstown Road. Patrons from the adjoining Heine Bros. Coffee drift in with their tea, coffee, latte or other drinks. Diners waiting for tables at Ramsi's Cafe peruse books and magazines until the Ramsi's hostess comes to

collect them.

"Boggs admits, " I practically kidnapped Gary Heine and Mike Mays when I knew they were looking at the space to start a coffee shop!"

This sense of community and cooperation is evident at the second Carmichael's store, the newly opened Crescent Hill location on Frankfort Avenue between Blue Dog Bakery and Deitrich's.

Thinking of the changes he and Carol have seen since they opened their business in 1978, Boggs says, "I feel as if we started from zero ... and we've grown up in the area. Over time, residents have developed a much better appreciation of the value of retailers and are more savvy — or hip — to the importance of a healthy business district. Today, Triangle residents and retailers have a more positive relationship, and I like to think we've been a part of that evolution."

### Cherokee Park to Have Volunteer Park Stewards

When Frederick law Olmsted wrote his "General Order for the Organization and Routine of Duty of the Keepers' Service of the Central Park" in 1873, he had at his disposal a large force of uniformed men to "keep" the New York City park. Their duty was to "prevent the misuse of the park, and aid and give confidence to visitors for its proper use."



Louisville's parks, too, once enjoyed the attention of park keepers, variously known as park police and park rangers. While

helping to re-establish such a corps is a goal of the Louisville Olmsted Parks Conservancy's strategic plan, in the short term we must focus on what we as park supporters can do to help our friends and neighbors and visitors enjoy and care for our parks.

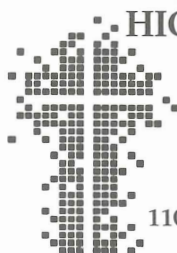
That's why we are creating a new volunteer opportunity in our Park Champions program. "Park Stewards" will be based at key locations and will walk or ride a regular beat. They will make the park more user-friendly and act as our eyes and ears in reporting problems and needed repairs.

Olmsted's emphasis was on how to best aid the proper use of the park. He urged park keepers to realize that "every foot of the Park's

surface ... has been fixed where it is with a purpose, and upon its being so used that it may continue to serve that purpose to the best advantage, and upon its not being otherwise used, depends its value."

We find that most people love our Olmsted parks, and, once informed, will do whatever they can to protect and treat them with care. You will have an ally in our Park Stewards. Soon, Stewards will be at their posts in Cherokee, our most heavily used park. Will this pilot program make a difference to you or your friends? Let us know. Or call 456-3275 to volunteer! 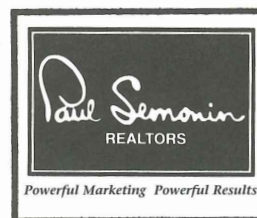

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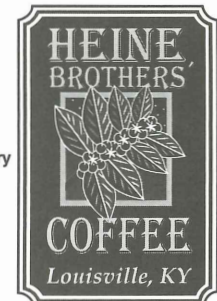
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# CITY AND COUNTY



## From City Hall

Third Ward Alderman Bill Allison reports:

One of my main priorities as your Alderman has been to be responsive to the needs of Third Ward residents. In 1999, our office handled over 3,000 constituent calls. It is important that we make sure that our basic services, such as garbage collection, street cleaning, junk pick up, recycling and fire and

police protection are working for every resident.

Many of you have seen the large vacuums that clean the sidewalks in the downtown area. After receiving numerous calls from Third Ward residents, we decided to bring the equipment to the Bardstown Road/Baxter Avenue corridor.

Brantley Services is sweeping the sidewalks along the corridor once a week from the intersection of Bardstown Road and Trevilian Way to the intersection of Baxter Avenue and Cherokee Road. These "Billy-Goat" litter vacuums clean the areas between the buildings to the street picking up trash, litter and other unsightly debris.

The sidewalk project for the 1400 block of Cherokee Road is scheduled to begin in Spring 2000. Residents soon will be able to walk safely from Willow Park to the Daniel Boone statue. Sidewalks are to be located on the residential side of the street and include improved drainage and new parkway lighting. Current on-street parking will remain on the residential side of the street. Following Metro Parks and Louisville Olmsted Parks Conservancy's recommendation, an "historic concrete mix" for the sidewalk and curb

will be used in the construction.

My office is holding another Senior Health Fair on Sunday, March 5th. Dr. Karen Cassidy and the Bellarmine College School of Nursing will assist us with this effort. Several agencies will have representatives available to offer a wide array of health screenings, health information and safety prevention to Third Ward seniors. The Senior Health Fair will be held at Bellarmine College, from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in Frazier Hall. For more information or if you need transportation, please call 574-3796.

I hope to see you at the Cherokee Triangle Art Fair on April 29th and 30th.

Please call my office if we can be of assistance. I am proud to represent your neighborhood and want every Third Ward resident to know that we are here to serve you.

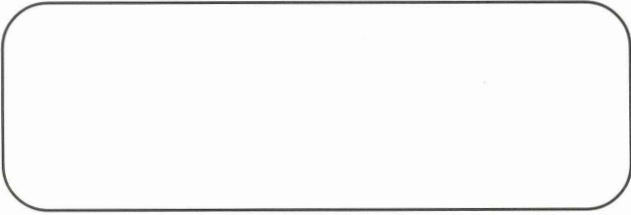

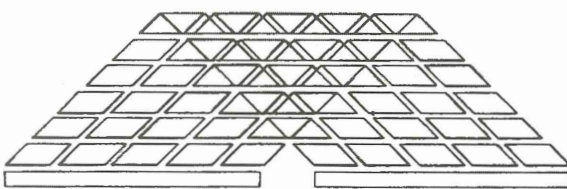
